Returning for its second vear, SALT festival of the Sea and Environment will take you on a creative and inspiring journey through the landscape and culture of the coast. There will be opportunities to walk, talk, make, write, observe, have fun, and share ideas over good food, SALT is cocurated by Quarterhouse, Folkestone Fringe and Chris Poundwhite of Go to the Pine with ideas gathered from the local community. The festival explores the way coastal environments shape who we are and how we think, and asks what the future might hold for the people and places that exist on the edge.

Alec Finlay: Waving / Drowning

29 Sept – 2 Oct, pick up map of directions from Quarterhouse or The Waiting Room



A new work made for SALT by the Scottish artist and poet Alec Finlay displayed in naval signal code. The artwork pays homage to the quiet anguish of Stevie Smith's poem and proverbial cry for help, not waving but drowning. Displayed by the sea, a short walk apart, her very English phrase takes on

a fresh burden of significance in this era of conflict and enforced migration. This temporary civic sculpture is in keeping with Finlay's generous experiential works, often collaborative, sometimes mapped directly onto the landscape.

Thomas A. Clark: Hidden in Nature

Scottish poet and artist Thomas A Clark has designed a simple pin badge that lightly directs our attention back to the natural world. Badges will be given out over the course of the festival.


SALT zine

Astrid Goldsmith: Polymer Quarterhouse theatre, 6.45pm, 2mins. Free Beware what you put in the sea! A stop-motion sci-fi marine revenge fantasy, *Polymer* is a dystopian vision of what might



happen if plastic sea pollution is not controlled. Drawing on the rich traditions of Atomic Age monster movies, Polymer shows a monstrous creature of our own making, stalking Folkestone and returning our plastics to us in the most devastating way. Polymer is made especially for SALT festival by local animator Astrid Goldsmith. Using puppet stop-motion, her short films offer a sideways look at the impact of human policy on the natural world

THEATRE Chris Dobrowolski: Antarctica

Antarctica is the most inhospitable climate in the world. It's the driest, windiest place on Earth, synonymous with lack of life, failed expedition attempts and the crisis of climate change. A place with no artists for miles around. A place that Chris Dobrowolski decided was perfect for him. For three and a half months Chris lived and worked alongside the medical professionals, researchers and scientists at the British Antarctic Survey, trying to experiment creatively whilst attempting to survive. He discovered that sometimes it's very difficult to justify your position as an Artist whilst everyone around you is a Hero.

Based on her acclaimed book *Wild: An Elemental Journey,* Jay Griffiths' talk will look at the marine rattlebag of the seashore and underwater world.

Building on their collaboration for SALT 2015, Joanna Jones, Helen Lindon and Clare Smith are making new collaborative work for SALT 2016 inspired by the elements.

Sea and Sky: Judith Anketell

Judith Anketell works in series of small paintings that record the passage of time and effects of weather through colour and light. Responding to the speed of changing conditions and revealing an immediacy of handling, the paintings, seen together, encourage comparison and make visible the shifting light and time of day.

Helen's work is formed from a single type of beach combing – the gathering of lost pieces of fishing tackle, known as 'ghost gear'. When ropes and nets from fishing boats become entangled below the waterline, the only option is to cut them free. In time the 'gear' finds its way back to dry land.

Karen is photographing private collections and developing participatory artwork around collecting to be shown in the new Folkestone Museum in 2017. Weathertime: Dover Arts Development Folkestone Sea Sports, The Stade, 30 Sept – 2 Oct, 11am – 4pm, every 30mins

Weathertime gathers work by 30 artists on either side of the Channel. Together they have created a visual diary, each responding to the weather on a particular day in Sept 2015 in painting, drawing, print and text, woven together with an original soundtrack into a 30-minute film.
